Division of Youth Services

PURPOSE

The Division of Youth Services (DYS) administers the community services and institutional programs for juveniles who have been adjudicated delinquent in Mississippi Youth Courts or who are at risk of becoming delinquent. DYS provides professional counseling, probation supervision and related services to children in their home communities, as well as education, rehabilitation and treatment services to children committed to institutional care.

MDHS MISSION STATEMENT

The mission of the Mississippi Department of Human Services is to offer Mississippians young and old tangible help today to create lasting hope for tomorrow.

VISION

The vision of the Mississippi Department of Human Services is that every child experience success in caring families and nurturing communities that cherish children and teach them to value family and community.

COMMUNITY SERVICES PROGRAMS

Goals

- To ensure a balanced approach of accountability, competency development and community safety while providing quality services that addresses the needs of children, their families, individual victims and the community.
- To test the effectiveness of community-based programs on reducing commitments to institutional care.
- To establish multi-agency, cooperative partnerships with local communities.
- To establish uniformity in DYS services, case management practices and procedures.

Services

Probation and After-Care Services are provided to juveniles referred to the Youth Courts in all 82 counties in Mississippi. Individual, group and family counseling, pre-court investigations, case management, referral and placement services are provided by Social Services Specialists.

The Interstate Commission for Juveniles, is the governing body of the Interstate Compact for Juveniles (ICJ). The Commission works to preserve child welfare, protection of juveniles, and the public. Its purpose is accomplished through the cooperative supervision of delinquent juveniles on probation or parole who move to Mississippi; the return of runaways, absconders, and escapees; the return of juveniles charged as delinquent; and additional measures that any two or more party states may find desirable.

Division of Youth Services

INSTITUTIONAL PROGRAMS

Oakley Youth Development Center (Oakley), located in rural Hinds County, incorporates holistic, therapeutic programs to promote rehabilitation. Oakley serves both boys and girls aged 12 to 17, who have been adjudicated delinquent by a local youth court for a felony-level offense and committed to the custody of the Mississippi Department of Human Services for placement at Oakley.

Goals

- Provide rehabilitative services to at-risk youth.
- Promote public safety in communities.
- Reduce the risk of re-offending.
- Address the specific criminogenic factors causing delinquent behavior.

Intake and Admissions: Staff work through a diagnostic and evaluation protocol which gathers medical, dental, recreational, educational, vocational and psychological data on each student. Students receive a complete physical and full-scale psychological assessment which includes personality profiling, drug and alcohol abuse risk questionnaire, suicide risk assessment, academic testing and a trauma risk assessment tool called the Trauma Symptom Checklist for Children.

Mental Health and Rehabilitative Programs: The psycho-educational program offered is designed to build basic concepts of self-discipline, self-worth, personal responsibility, and respect for lawful authority. Individual and Group Counseling provides Dialectical Behavior Therapy (DBT), Cognitive Behavior Therapy (CBT), social skills development, anger management, sex education that includes information on sexually transmitted diseases and abstinence, drug and alcohol awareness, character education, sexual offender counseling and psycho-correctional skills. The Honors Program (HP) is a voluntary program for eligible youth which combines specialized classes with work projects designed to benefit other youth at the facility and the public. The program allows youth to participate in the election process, contribute to the local community and learn to preserve the environment. Youth attend special classes, participate in the student government which helps direct the students' program activities, engage in work projects both on the Oakley campus and in the local community to earn additional privileges.

Academic and Career & Technical Educational Programs: Students are placed in academic and vocational classes at Williams School on the Oakley campus according to their previous school placement and additional educational evaluation. This enables students to continue their educational advancement during their commitment. DYS' non-public school is accredited by the Mississippi Department of Education to provide a curriculum in conformity with the DYS mission and accreditation requirements.

- Local Area Network (LAN) Computer Labs provide remedial, job interest assessment and cognitive development, facilitated by the Cognitive Development Program.
- Electronic classrooms allow students to experience "virtual" field trips and view satellite downlinks of various programs.
- Williams School has a licensed library/media specialist who provides instructional planning and delivery assistance to students and teachers.
- GED Preparation and Testing is offered to eligible students.

Division of Youth Services

- ACT® preparation and testing is offered to students who have graduated or earned a GED.
- Career Technical Education funds and grants are used to provide programs such as Welding, Carpentry, Small Engine Repair, Auto Body Repair, Basic Business Computer and Custodial Maintenance.
- Students who are eligible can take the Armed Services Vocational Aptitude Battery (ASVAB) test.
- A majority of the teachers are dual certified in their subject areas and Special Education.
- Students take their Subject Area Test Program (SATP) or Mississippi Academic Assessment Program (MAAP) test, while enrolled in the Williams School.





Referral Intakes









1. **Total Referrals in 2023, Data Source:** MYCIDS

2. **Formally Petitioned:** order of the court is to formally petition or refer to prosecutor for formal proceedings

3. **Diverted:** order of the court is informal adjustment, take no action, child warned or counseled informally, MDHS monitor child or family informally, and parents warned or counseled

4. **Referred to Drug Court:** order of the court is to refer youth to drug court

5. **Adjudication Hearing:** referrals that were formally petitioned and an adjudication hearing was scheduled

6. **Referrals Awaiting Adjudication:** referrals that were formally petitioned but an adjudication hearing has not been scheduled

7. **Certified at Transfer Hearing:** a transfer hearing was held and resulted in transfer action

8. **Dismissed, Informal Adjustment, or Held Open at Adjudication:** formally petitioned referrals that are diverted during the adjudication hearing

9. **No Hearing Action:** formally petitioned referrals that had a scheduled adjudication hearing but no action was entered into MYCIDS

10. **Adjudicated:** formally petitioned referrals that were adjudicated delinquent

11. **Dismissed at Disposition:** formally petitioned and adjudicated referrals that were dismissed or held open during the disposition hearing

12. **Referrals Awaiting Disposition Hearing:** formally petitioned and adjudicated referrals that are waiting to be disposed

13. **No Hearing Action Entered:** formally petitioned and adjudicated referrals that had a disposition hearing but no action was entered into MYCIDS

14. **Disposed:** formally petitioned and adjudicated referrals that were given a disposition

15. **Oakley Youth Development Center:** court action of OYDC at disposition hearing. Data provided by DYS

16. **Formal Probation:** court action of formal probation at disposition hearing







Cases by County (N=10,777)





Appendix A

Youth Court Terms and Definitions

ADJUDICATION: The process of rendering a judicial decision as to whether the facts alleged in a petition or other pleading are true. An adjudicatory hearing is a civil youth court proceeding in which it is determined whether the allegations of the delinquency petition are supported by legally admissible evidence beyond a reasonable doubt. This is analogous to the trial to determine guilt in a criminal case. .

BURGLARY: The breaking into and entering of a building with intent to commit a crime.

CERTIFICATION: A term generally used to refer to the process of transferring a minor's case from the youth court to the criminal court for prosecution.

CHILD ABUSE: "physical or mental injury, sexual abuse, negligent treatment or maltreatment of a child by a person who is responsible for the child's welfare under circumstances which indicate that the child's health or welfare is harmed or threatened..." (Child Abuse Protection and Treatment Act,¹ Pub. Law 94-94. 1974).

CHILD NEGLECT: Failure by a parent or custodian to tender appropriate care to a child; an act of omission by the person legally responsible for a child's well-being. Failure to provide a child with suitable food, shelter, clothing, hygiene, medical care or parental supervision.

COMMIT: To send a person to prison, to an asylum, workhouse, or reformatory by lawful authority.

COMPLAINANT: Synonymous with "plaintiff."

COMPLAINT: The first or initiatory pleading on the part of the complainant, or plaintiff, in a civil action. The initiating pleading in a criminal or civil case, filed by the moving party and setting out the cause of action.

CONTEMPT OF COURT: Any act calculated to embarrass, hinder or obstruct a court in the administration of justice, or calculated to lessen its authority or dignity. Contempt proceedings are of two kinds: direct and indirect. Direct contempt are those violations committed in the immediate presence of the court. Indirect contempt is the term chiefly used with reference to the failure or refusal to obey a lawful order.

CONTRACT: An oral or written agreement between two or more parties which is enforceable by law.

CUSTODY: The right to or responsibility of a child's care and control, carrying with it the duty of providing food, shelter, medical care, education and discipline.

DETENTION: The temporary confinement of a youth by a public officer pursuant to law.

DETENTION HEARING: A judicial hearing to determine the interim custody of a minor pending an adjudication of the petition. sentencing phase in a criminal case.

Appendix A

Youth Court Terms and Definitions

DISPOSITION: The order of a juvenile court determining what is to be done with a minor already adjudged to be within the court's jurisdiction. This phase of the juvenile proceedings is analogous to the sentencing phase in a criminal case.

DIVERSION: A procedure utilized to handle relatively minor behavior problems informally, without referral to the youth court for adjudication.

DUE PROCESS: The constitutionally guaranteed right of persons be treated by the law with fundamental fairness. These rights include the right to adequate notice in advance of the hearing, the right to counsel, the right to confront and cross-examine witnesses, the right to decline to give self-incriminating testimony, and the right to have allegations of conduct that would be criminal if committed by an adult proven beyond a reasonable doubt.

EMBEZZLEMENT: The fraudulent appropriation by a person to his own use or benefit of property or money entrusted to him by another.

EVIDENCE: The available body of proof put forth during a trial for the purpose of proving the defendant committed the alleged offense.

EXHIBIT: A paper, document or other article produced and exhibited to a court during a trial or hearing.

EXPUNGEMENT: The destruction or sealing of records of minors or adults, after the passage of a specified period of time or when the person reaches a specified age and has not committed another offense.

FALSE PRETENSES: A designed behavior intended to deceive or misrepresent of existing facts or conditions.

FELONY: A serious crime generally punishable by imprisonment in a state or federal penitentiary for more than one (1) year.

FOSTER CARE: A form of substitute care, usually in a home licensed by a public agency, for children whose welfare requires that they be removed from their own homes.

FRAUD: An intentional perversion of truth; deceitful practice or device resorted to with intent to deprive another of property or other right, or in some manner to do him injury.

HEARING: A trial or other proceeding before a judicial officer.

JURISDICTION: 1) The power of a particular court to hear cases involving certain categories of person or allegation. 2) A geographical area subject to a particular law or court.

MISDEMEANOR: A crime less serious than a felony, usually punishable by a fine or incarceration in a city or county jail for less than a year.

Appendix A

Youth Court Terms and Definitions

PAROLE: The release of a youth from detention on certain conditions, and suspension of commitment during the period of relief.

PARTIES: The persons who are actively concerned in the prosecution or defense of legal proceedings.

PETITION: A civil pleading filed to initiate a matter in juvenile court, setting forth the alleged grounds for the court to take jurisdiction of the case and asking the court to intervene.

PROBATION: The process to release an offender under a suspension of sentence, during good behavior, and generally under the supervision of a probation officer. In youth court, a disposition which allows the defendant or the minor to remain at liberty under the supervision of a probation officer and usually required compliance with certain conditions.

PROSECUTOR: A lawyer who represents the government by instigating the prosecution against the party who he suspects to be guilty and has the burden of proving the allegations in the petition beyond a reasonable doubt in youth court proceedings.

STATUS OFFENSE: The term essentially refers to non-criminal misbehavior, which would not be criminal if committed by the adult (e.g., truancy, runaway, etc.). The behavior is an offense only because of the minor's status as a minor.

STATUTE: A law enacted by a state legislature or the U.S. Congress.

TESTIMONY: A statement or declaration made to establish a fact or facts and given under oath.

TRANSFER: The sending of a case from the juvenile court to adult court for trial or returning a case to the Youth Court for prosecution.
